ACADEMIC BENEFITS

- Higher achievement in reading and math
- Greater progress on IEP goals
- More engagement, motivation, and participation
- Access to stronger models and higher expectations
- Higher-quality instruction through UDL and differentiated teaching
- More meaningful time on academic tasks

SOCIAL + EMOTIONAL BENEFITS

- More friendships, social interactions, and peer connections
- Increased confidence, belonging, and self-worth
- Stronger communication skills
- Opportunities to contribute, lead, and learn from peers
- Reduced stigma and greater emotional resilience

SECTION 2: THE 10 MOST COMMON FAMILY QUESTIONS + FAST FACTS

1. “WILL MY CHILD STILL GET SUPPORT?”

Yes. Support doesn't go away — it shifts to where learning happens. Your child still receives accommodations, specialized instruction, and services.

2. “WILL THEY FALL BEHIND IN A GENERAL EDUCATION CLASSROOM?”

Research consistently shows the opposite. With higher expectations, stronger models, and increased engagement, academic gains improve.

3. “WHAT IF THEY NEED MORE HELP THAN PEERS?”

Inclusive classrooms are designed to offer individualized support through co-teaching, paraprofessionals, specialists, and Universal Design for Learning (UDL).

4. “WILL PEERS ACCEPT THEM?”

Peers often become advocates, friends, and collaborators — and their own outcomes improve too.

5. “IS THIS LEGALLY SUPPORTED?”

Yes. Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) requires education in the least restrictive environment that meets a child’s needs. Inclusion aligns with those rights.

6. “WILL THE CURRICULUM BE WATERED DOWN?”

No. Students access grade-level learning with supports — not reduced expectations.

7. “WHAT IF THEY STRUGGLE SOCIALLY?”

Inclusion increases friendships, communication, and natural peer interactions.

8. “DOES INCLUSION WORK FOR STUDENTS WITH SIGNIFICANT DISABILITIES?”

Yes. Research shows the greatest gains — academically and socially — for students with complex support needs.

9. “HOW DOES THE SCHOOL PREPARE TEACHERS FOR INCLUSIVE PRACTICES?”

Most schools provide ongoing training to help teachers support all learners—things like professional development, co-planning time, and guidance on inclusive instructional approaches. Higher graduation rates, increased independence, employment opportunities, and stronger community inclusion.

TOP FAST FACTS

1. Students with disabilities do better academically in inclusive settings.
2. Inclusive settings build stronger social and communication skills.
3. Students without disabilities also benefit academically and socially.
4. Segregated settings show lower academic engagement and fewer opportunities.
5. Inclusion predicts success after high school: graduation, employment, independence.
